CONSERVATION COMMISSION UPDATE

Hello fellow Sprague citizens,

Sorry we missed last month. As we all know sometimes life gets too busy. Well here we are working slowly out of winter. Speaking of that, please be careful going up to the Mukluk Preserve, particularly if you have a low riding vehicle. Although Spring is slowly approaching, winter is still here, it is still a great time to do some winter hiking and to get outside so that we all don't get stuck in those winter blues. So bundle up and get out and enjoy the beauty that this season has to offer. We hope to team up soon with the Rec. committee and plan some more winter activities up at the Mukluk to help our fellow citizens to spend a much happier and healthier cold season.

The conservation volunteers have been busy marking boundaries, leading hikes, and working down around the headrace cutting trees.

Also, the Environmental Review Team Report has been delivered to us. Copies are available for anyone to review at Town Hall. Ask Claire for a copy if you are interested, or see Walt Bell at the transfer station. This team of experts did a great job on assessing the property's natural resources and making recommendations for future uses.

Please keep in mind that the Conservation Commission supports preserving most of the Mukluk Preserve for open space for now and forever. What is at stake here is not just the preservation of this 280 acre tract of land, but the preservation of an entire 2,000 acre river valley. We will soon be voting as a town to accept the \$500,000 open space grant that the state has already awarded us. Please get out and vote to help us in our efforts. We are at an important time in our history. We hope that all of us can get together on this issue and preserve this important asset to our town's future.

Sayles School is currently conducting kindergarten registration for the 2009-2010 school year.

Parents of children who will be five years old by January 1, 2010, must provide birth certificates, social security numbers and immunization records for rubella, measles, polio, mumps, diptheria, pertussis tetanus, hepatitis B and chicken pox. Parents also need to provide three proofs of residency showing the street address.

It is important that all students planning to attend full-day kindergarten during the 2009-2010 school year be registered as soon as possible. Please call

PACK 19 SCOUTS CONSTRUCT BLUEBIRD HOUSES

On February 14, members of Pack 19 of Baltic, Den 3 and Den 5, met at a home workshop in Hanover to learn about woodworking and to build bird houses designed for the Eastern Bluebird (*Sialia sialis*). Before building the birdhouses, the scouts learned the history of such woodworking tools as wood planes and other tools designed to smooth and prepare wood, how holes are bored in wood, how to hammer nails and how to use a brace and bit.

Besides learning how to identify bluebirds, each scout built and took home at least one bird-house, received written instructions on the installation and care of birdhouses, and participated in the inspection and cleaning of several nesting boxes that had been installed the previous year.

Den 3 is lead by Den Leader Stuart Woronecki. Wolf Cub Scouts from Den 3 participating were Quentin Carr, Marcus Gada, and Jack Woronecki.

Den 5 is lead by Leader Brian Miner. Wolf cub scouts from Den 5 participating were Kyle Stewart, Colin Giles, and Daylen Miner. Both Dens were assisted by Den Chief Noah Carr.

What you can do to help bluebirds: You need a birdhouse, of course. Late winter or early spring is the time to install the house, and to clean out nesting boxes installed in previous years. There are many websites dedicated to informing the public about the Eastern Bluebird that will tell you where to install the houses and how high off the ground to install them. One website that is a good place to obtain information about bluebirds and obtain plans for birdhouses is the State of Connecticut's Department of Environmental Protection website. Or you can purchase locally a kit or a house already made.
