Safety Facts Carbon Monoxide Safety



FACTS: A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time. Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms in the home. When one sounds, they all sound.

- ❑ Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- ❑ Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- ❑ Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- ❑ Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- ❑ If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department 911.
- ❑ If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel arrive.
- ❑ If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engines or motors indoors, even if the garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- ❑ During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- ❑ A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.

HOME HEATING EQUIPMENT: Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

From the Desk of the First Selectman

I would love to say Spring is here but I believe we have 4 or more weeks of potential bad weather. So far, we have not exceeded dramatically the planned for expenses in storm related materials, weather related overtime, or equipment repair due to long hours of use. I keep the BOF up to date on these expenses and hope that winter is reaching its conclusion. The Town buildings' roofs were evaluated and no problems were discovered. A special thank you to Bill Trudelle and his crew who cleaned off the school roof potentially saving the town thousands of dollars in roof shoveling costs -- Great Job!

As was mentioned last month, I am providing you with the capital improvement plans for 2 more areas: water and wastewater and town buildings.

The water and wastewater plan was developed with the Sprague Water and Sewer Authority (a board of the Town), their engineering firm and the water and sewer superintendent. The Town provides water service to 433 households, and sewer service to 562 households in all three villages. In addition, service is provided to all 3 schools in town, the fire department, senior housing, 3 of the churches in town, the post offices and all town buildings. To put this in perspective, there are 1,188 households identified in the Town according to the latest census data. This plan documents potential costs and potential funding sources.

The second plan identifies areas of town buildings needing improvement or upgrading. This was developed in conjunction with the library director, the road foreman, the facilities manager and the town's engineer. It provides possible costs and funding sources.

I also have been busy paying attention to both the Governor's budget and pending legislation to ensure that impact on the Town is minimal. As this critical budget travels through the legislative process I will continue to keep an eye on it.

Please watch the bulletin boards at the town hall and around town for the spring activities that our volunteer Boards and Commissions have planned. From recreation activities to library events to Earth Day, there's something in Sprague for everyone this upcoming (please come soon) spring!

The word of the month is: Salutation. It was selected by Annmarie. It means: an expression of greeting, goodwill, or courtesy by word, gesture, or ceremony.



Greetings from the Hanover Post Office



Hello Sprague! Spring is almost here and we are almost done digging out from the deepest snow our town has seen in years! I hope you are all recovering and looking for some ways to make your life a little easier.

The US Postal Service can help you with that task in several ways. First, if you are tired of shoveling out that mailbox, you could always open a PO Box in either of the three local Post Offices – Baltic, Versailles, or Hanover, depending on where you live. Boxes range from \$40.00 - \$100.00 per year depending on the size and will keep your mail dry, secure, and ready for pick up as early as 10 am. Payments can be made on an annual or 6 month basis, and are available in both key and combination lock styles. For those of you who are not home during office hours and still would like to take advantage of this service, Hanover has outside mailboxes with 24/7 key access for \$56.00 per year. They are going fast – only 10 outside units are unrented at the moment. Stop in today and see what we can do for you.

For the stamp enthusiast out there, we have new releases coming out soon – all in the Forever format. The Jazz Appreciation and Latin Music Legends stamps are both due to be released in March and are a great way to brighten your day after all the white and gray we've seen so far this year! Also out in March is the new Neon Celebrate Stamp. Add lots of color to any special occasion card – from birthdays to anniversaries and reunions of all kinds ☺ All three of these – and our previously released stamps - are available in a pressure sensitive adhesive pane of 20 stamps for \$8.80 each.

Upcoming wedding on the horizon? We have lots of choices for your nuptial invitations, regardless of the weight. The Wedding Rings and purple Love Pansies are the most popular for the smaller invitations and RSVP cards. I have also had people buy Adopt a Pet or Evergreen Forever or Dolphins. If you're looking for something a little more personalized, why not try customized postage through USPS.com at <http://www.usps.com/postagesolutions/customizedpostage.htm> ? It's easy to download your favorite digital photos and design your own stamps for any occasion. Use engagement pictures for your wedding invitations, new baby photos for your announcements, even a prized flower garden shared on a dreary day for get well cards or to show off your horticultural prowess – the possibilities are endless!

One more note: the lunch times for the post offices in our area are purposefully varied for you to have full retail window service available anytime during the day. Hanover is closed from 12 – 1:15, Versailles is closed 12:30 – 1:30 and Baltic is closed 1 – 2:30. This will allow you to drive directly to the office that can best serve you when you are ready for personalized service.

As always, any of our services from stamps by mail, to online shipping options, to parcel pick up are all available 24/7 at USPS.com. We deliver Convenience, Quality and Service just for you! See you soon!






